About Today's Service

Over a century ago, in the Chapel Royal at King's College – Cambridge University, a Christmas liturgy unlike any other in the Western Communion was held.

Just six short weeks prior to Christmas 1918, the Great War, World War I, had ended. In response, the Rt. Rev. Eric Milner—White, the College Chaplin, desired to bring to the people of Cambridge a Christmas service which would allow the simplistic beauty of Christian Worship to shine through the post-War darkness. During the Great War, a known 23-percent of the young men of King's College perished alongside a countless number from the City of Cambridge herself. In response, Rev. Milner—White sought a service which would allow for the grieving of the lost young men, while drawing in those whose faith had been lost through the War.

The service which Milner—White created is today known as *The Festival Service of Nine Lessons & Carols*. Over the last century, this service has become a tradition for the people of Cambridge. For many in the English—Speaking Church around the world, it is the defining moment which signals the imminent arrival of Christmas. Today, this great Anglican contribution to the Western Liturgical Calendar is celebrated by congregations across denominations around the world. Next Sunday evening, the people of Great Britain and Northern Ireland will tune into BBC TV and Radio for the 105th annual celebration of *The Festival Service of Nine Lessons & Carols*.

Today, we join in this great tradition by celebrating our own version of this great Festival. Our hymns may be different from those which will be Sung in the Chapel Royal this Christmas, but the Spirit will be the same. In this liturgy the congregation walks through the history of God's people, and his covenants with them. We will experience the Fall of Man from God's Grace. We will hear of God's promises to Abraham as the foundations of the Old Covenant are laid. The words of the Great Prophet Isaiah will echo through time as we recount the prophecies of the Messiah. We will experience, through the words of the Gospel writers, the arrival of the Messiah into this earth.

Today, our carols will span many of the great traditions of Western Hymnody. We will sing from the days before the Protestant Reformation. The sounds of long forgotten Royal Christmases in the British Court of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert will echo through our Nave. Our voices will raise carols from the great English Hymn Revival along with carols

written at both ends of the American Civil War. This is a Christmas Celebration for all ages, all generations, and all time. As we lift our voices in song, if the music for the Carol is printed in the service, please stand as you are able in body or in spirit and join.

During the Processional Antiphon, while it may be customary across denominational traditions to stand immediately when the music begins, *this evening we ask that you remain seated until the Great Procession passes your pew.* As the Processional Antiphon progresses, it will, just as the music of the church has, transition from a solo and Choral Antiphon to a Congregational Hymn – so join us in singing the refrain beginning at verse two, and then on the verses for verses 4 and 5.

In the history of the service of Lessons & Carols, it is not the usual practice to include the Holy Eucharist in the service. However, on ever so rare occasions over the last century, this ancient Rite of the church has been celebrated at the High Altar of the Chapel Royal. As this is the only gathering of the worshiping community of First United Methodist Church on this day, Holy Communion will be celebrated as part of this service.

In the United Methodist Church, we acknowledge that Holy Communion, the Eucharist (which literally means "thanksgiving"), the Lord's Supper, is the family meal for Christians and a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. As such, <u>all persons are invited to come to the table</u> and receive the sacrament.

We welcome everyone here to this service on this morning as we celebrate the Fourth Sunday of Advent, and pray for you and your families this Christmas season. From the Clergy, Staff, and Congregants of First United Methodist Church – Merry Christmas, and may God show blessing upon you.

The Bidding

The Celebrant: Beloved in Christ, be it this Christmas Season our care and delight to prepare ourselves to hear again the message of the angels; in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem and see this thing which is come to pass, and with the shepherds and the wise men adore the Child lying in his Mother's arms.

> Let us read and mark in Holy Scripture the tale of the loving purposes of God from the first days of our disobedience unto the glorious Redemption brought us by this Holy Child; and with the whole of the Christian Communion let us make this Church glad with our joyous carols of praise.

> But first, let us pray for the needs of his whole world; for peace and goodwill over all the earth; for unity and fellowship within the Church Christ came to build. And because this of all things would rejoice his heart, let us at this time remember in his name the poor and the helpless, the cold and the hungry, the abused, the exploited, and the oppressed; the sick in body and in mind, and them that mourn; the isolated, the lonely and the unloved; the aged and the little children; for all who find themselves caught in the terrors of endless and ongoing wars; and for all who know not the Lord Jesus, or who love him not, or who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

> Lastly, let us remember before God all those who rejoice with us, but upon another shore and in a greater light, that multitude which no man can number, whose hope was in the Word made flesh, and with whom, in this Lord Jesus, we for evermore are one.

We observe a Sacred Silence until disturbed by the tolling of a bell.

As those coming into a spirit of worship and preparing to receive the Holy Sacrament, let us now pause to confess our sins before God and one another.

The People: Merciful God, we confess that we have not loved you with our whole heart. We have failed to be an obedient church. We have not done your will, we have broken your law, we have rebelled against your love, we have not loved our neighbors, and we have not heard the cry of the needy. Forgive us, we pray. Free us for joyful obedience, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Celebrant: Hear the good news: Christ died for us while we were yet sinners; that proves God's love toward us.

In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven!

The People: In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven.

Glory to God. Amen.

The Lighting of the Candle of Love



THE FIRST LESSON

- The Fall of Man -

Genesis 3:8 - 15; 17 - 19

The Reader The First Lesson – Man's fall from Grace. As recorded by in the third chapter of Genesis.

THE SECOND LESSON

- God Promises Abraham to be a Father of Nations -

Genesis 22:9 - 19

The Reader

The Second Lesson – God promises to make Abraham a father of Many Nations. As recounted in the twenty-second chapter of Genesis,.

They arrived at the place God had described to him. Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood on it. He tied up his son Isaac and laid him on the altar on top of the wood. Then Abraham stretched out his hand and took the knife to kill his son as a sacrifice. But the Lord's messenger called out to Abraham from heaven, "Abraham? Abraham?" Abraham said, "I'm here."

The messenger said, "Don't stretch out your hand against the young man, and don't do anything to him. I now know that you revere God and didn't hold back your son, your only son, from me." Abraham looked up and saw a single ram caught by its horns in the dense underbrush. Abraham went over, took the ram, and offered it as an entirely burned offering instead of his son. Abraham named that place "the Lord sees." That is the reason people today say, "On this mountain the Lord is seen."

He will judge the needy with righteousness, and decide with equity for those who suffer in the land.



Luke 1:26 – 35, 38


The Reader The Fifth Lesson – The Angel Gabriel greets the Virgin. As recorded in the first chapter of the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

When Elizabeth was six months pregnant, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a city in Galilee, to a virgin who was engaged to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David's house. The virgin's name was Mary. When the angel came to her, he said, "Rejoice, favored one! The Lord is with you!" She was confused by these words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. THE SIXTH LESSON

- The Birth of Jesus Christ, The Messiah -

Luke 2:1 - 7

The Reader The Sixth Lesson – The birth of the Messiah, Jesus Christ. As recorded in the second chapter of the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

In those days Caesar Augustus declared that everyone throughout the empire should be enrolled in the tax lists. This first enrollment occurred when Quirinius governed Syria. Everyone went to their own cities to be enrolled. Since Joseph belonged to David's house and family line, he went up from the city of Nazareth in Galilee to David's city, called Bethlehem, in Judea. He went to be enrolled together with Mary, who was promised to him in marriage and who was pregnant. While they were there, the time came for Mary to have her baby. She gave birth to her firstborn child, a son, wrapped him snugly, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the guestroom.



The Reader

The Seventh Lesson – The angels greet the shepherds and send them to Bethlehem. As recorded in the second chapter of the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

Nearby shepherds were living in the fields, guarding their sheep at night. The Lord's angel stood before them, the Lord's glory shone around them, and they were terrified.

The angel said, "Don't be afraid! Look! I bring good news to you—wonderful, joyous news for all people. Your savior is born today in David's city. He is Christ the Lord. This is a sign for you: you will find a newborn baby wrapped snugly and lying in a manger." Suddenly a great assembly of the heavenly forces was with the angel praising God. THE EIGHTH LESSON

- The Wise Men Come from Afar -

Matthew 2:1 - 12

The Reader

The Eighth Lesson – The Wise Men come afar bearing great gifts. As recorded in the second chapter of the Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in the territory of Judea during the rule of King Herod, magi came from the east to Jerusalem. They asked, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We've seen his star in the east, and we've come to honor him."

When King Herod heard this, he was troubled, and everyone in Jerusalem was troubled with him. He gathered all the chief priests and the legal experts and asked them where the Christ was to be born. They said, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for this is what the prophet wrote:

You, Bethlehem, land of Judah, by no means are you least among the rulers of Judah, because from you will come one who governs, who will shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the magi and found out from them the time when the star had first appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search carefully for the child. When you've found him, report to me so that I too may go and honor him." When they heard the king, they went; and look, the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stood over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were filled with joy. They entered the house and saw the child with Mary his mother. Falling to their knees, they honored him. Then they opened their treasure chests and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Because they were warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they went back to their own country by another route.

When we turned away, and our love failed, your love remained steadfast. You delivered us from captivity, made covenant to be our sovereign God, and spoke to us through your prophets, who looked

for that day when justice shall roll down like waters and

righteousness like an ever-flowing stream, when nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. And so, with your people on earth and all the company of heaven,

we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

The People: Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and

earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the

highest.

The Celebrant: Holy are you, and blessed is your Son Jesus Christ, whom you sent in the fullness of time to be a light to the nations. You scatter the proud in the imagination of their hearts and have mercy on those who fear you from generation to generation. You put down the mighty from their thrones and exalt those of low degree. You fill the hungry with good things, and the rich you send empty away. Your own Son came among us as a servant to be Emmanuel, your presence with us. He humbled himself in obedience to your will and freely accepted death on a cross. By the baptism of his suffering. death, and resurrection you gave birth to your Church, delivered us from slavery to sin and death, and made with us a new covenant by water and the Spirit

> On the night in which he gave himself up for us, he took bread, gave thanks to you, broke the bread, gave it to his disciples, and said: "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

> When the supper was over he took the cup, gave thanks to you, gave it to his disciples, and said: "Drink from this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."

> And so, in remembrance of these your mighty acts in Jesus Christ, we offer ourselves in praise and thanksgiving as a holy and living sacrifice, in union with Christ's offering for us, as we proclaim the mystery of faith.

The People: Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

The Celebrant: Pour out your Holy Spirit on us gathered here, and on these gifts of bread and wine. Make them be for us the body and blood of Christ, that we may be for the world the body of Christ, redeemed by his blood.

> By your Spirit make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world, until Christ comes in final victory, and we feast at his heavenly banquet.

Through your Son Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit in your holy Church, all honor and glory is yours, almighty God, now and for ever.

The People: AMEN.

The Celebrant: And now, with the confidence of children, let us boldly pray the words taught to us by Christ, saying ...


